A Word of Devotion:

PRACTICING PEACE

You are about to read an excerpt from "Practicing Peace: A Devotional Walk Through the Quaker Tradition" This is a Quaker Devotional filled with unique quote and motivating stories. To purchase your copy <u>CLICK HERE</u> Quakers have been practicing peace as a spiritual discipline since the 1650s. Their well-worn path to peace begins in prayer and worship, leads to recognizing God in all people, includes practicing nonviolence, and endeavors to make love the guiding force in all they do. This path, which is available to everyone, celebrates life's highest joys and witnesses life's deepest tragedies amidst the beauty, uncertainty, and violence surrounding us. While practicing peace is not always easy, it is a spiritual discipline that expands love, generates hope, and satisfies our soul's deep longing for peace.

I took my own first tentative steps along the path of practicing peace in the manner of Friends at an unlikely time in my life. I was the mother of a preschool-age son and was employed as a health care administrator, feeling overburdened, working long days, and yearning for a more peaceful personal life. It wasn't that I didn't care about the state of the world; there was simply no time for peace work in my already overscheduled days. So, in an attempt to alleviate the stress induced by my busyness, I began meditating every morning and listening within to discern what my next direction in life should be.

As a first step, I was led to simplify my lifestyle, which created more space for meditation, and over time I slowly began to experience more inner peace. However, as I continued to listen within, I grew increasingly spiritually disturbed. Through prayer I was more aware of the world's problems and saw that potential nuclear and biological holocausts were hovering over my son's future. I felt overwhelmed, powerless, and did not know how to educate, prepare, or protect my son in a world filled with so many weapons of destruction. No one had warned me, however, that praying and meditating regularly might change my life in unexpected ways. One morning as I meditated I was surprised by a spiritual nudge to organize a candlelight prayer vigil for peace. I was astonished! I was a new Quaker and had not grown up among peace activists, so I had never attended a prayer vigil, let alone organized one!

I kept praying and listening within, hoping that this spiritual nudge to take action (also called a leading) for which I felt so abysmally unprepared, would be lifted from my path. I was already practicing peace through daily meditation, making my family a priority, and working for a nonprofit agency. So why was God asking for more? Soon most of my prayer time was being spent plaintively explaining to God that I was too busy to take on anything else, and pointing out (in case God hadn't noticed) that I was not spiritually prepared or qualified to plan a public prayer vigil.

If truth be told, though, my real motives for resisting this leading were suspect. The thought of holding a candle and praying in public filled me with dread. I was afraid of being embarrassed. What if I looked foolish to people on the sidewalk? I lived in a small town. Would my conservative neighbors stop being friendly? I was afraid of financial repercussions. Would I have to pay a price professionally?

Many of my friends were secular and skeptical of prayer. Would they shy away from me for praying in public? I was new at following leadings. If I organized this vigil, what might God ask me to do next? These questions kept arising and I kept procrastinating in the hope that someone else more prepared than I would come forward.

Finally, I began to wonder if perhaps God was reminding me of a prior spiritual commitment. Five years earlier, when I was pregnant, I had watched Golda Meir, Prime Minister of Israel, praying on the evening news that every child born that year be born into a generation of peace. I was living in a house surrounded by tall pines and bordered by a whitewater river. As I listened to her words co-mingle with the rushing waters and rustling pines, I felt the new life of my child stir in me, and I was flooded with a profound sense of God's compassionate presence. In feeling God's love, I accepted the fact that I was a pacifist and I dedicated myself to trying to make a peaceful world for children everywhere. In that moment of dedication I also experienced a deep sense of promise: God would never leave me alone in my practice of peace. What transpired that evening felt like a private covenant just between God and me.

Until I felt led to organize the peace vigil nothing out of the ordinary had been required of me. But now my private commitment to God was about to become public. When I finally accepted the fact that my spiritual integrity was hanging on the slim thread of my willingness to make this public witness, I reluctantly began organizing. I tentatively shared my leading with friends, who immediately encouraged and supported me in planning the event.

When the day for the vigil arrived I was filled with anxiety, but my fears were unfounded. As I held my candle outside the federal building in a circle with others beneath a soft, gray sky and gently falling snow, I was released from a false sense of social propriety, and I experienced a deep sense of calm.

A picture of our prayer vigil showed up on the front page of the next day's newspaper, and I was surprised and pleased that our message had been acknowledged. But more important to me personally, my relationship with God had been transformed through my reluctant, but faithful spiritual obedience in acting on what I heard while listening within.

Quakerism is sometimes described as an experientially based religion because by acting in faith, Friends often discover what it is they believe. Through my experience of organizing the vigil, I came to believe that God really does lead us through prayer and invites even the unsuspecting, imperfect, and unprepared among us to practice

Dear Friends,

As I hope you have heard already, a gathering for Young Adult Friends from around the world will be held from 1 – 5 August 2024, immediately before the FWCC World Plenary Meeting, from the 5 - 12 August 2024 in Johannesburg, South Africa.

Inspired by the Southern African word ubuntu, the theme will be based on Galatians 3:28 : "There is neither Jew nor Greek, neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

The event is intended to improve mutual understanding of Quaker diversity amongst Young Adult Friends worldwide, to reinforce international Quaker identity, and to re-establish the Young Adult Friends global network, leading to joint actions and plans. The event is planned by an international team consisting principally of Young Friends from Africa, with some representation from elsewhere, supported by elders from Southern Africa Yearly Meeting and the Africa Section.

This letter is to encourage young adult Friends, ages 18-35, to attend both conferences. Registration is open now at FWCC World Plenary Meeting. The cost for both conferences, all 12 days including room, board, and program, is \$1300 for Friends from higher income countries like the US and Canada. For lower income countries, the cost is \$130. Airfare and other expenses are separate.

OUAKERS IN HISTORY

The Pease Family 1665



At the beginning of the eighteenth century the Pease family were wool producers, dyers and weavers in Yorkshire, in the North of England. Most of them were Quakers. A century later they were prominent Quaker industrialists, who played a key role in the development of railways. They also produced the first Quaker MP and later, eight others.

Joseph was a popular name in the Pease family. First generation Quaker Joseph Pease (1665 - 1719), here called Joseph I, was in the business of buying and selling wool in the Darlington area in Yorkshire. In 1711 he moved to Hull where he introduced a new industry of linseed crushing. Joseph II (1737-1807), his grandson, began in this business too. However he was so well liked and respected by his customers that it was not long before they turned to him for advice and help with financial matters. Many asked him if they could leave their money and valuables with him for safekeeping. This eventually led him to establish the very first bank in Yorkshire, in Hull, in 1754. It was known as Pease Partners Bank.

Quakers use the term Query to refer to a question or series of questions used for reflection and in spiritual exercises. Friends have used Queries as tools for offering spiritual challenges to the community for much of their

history. Consider this...

-Does your inward faith turn outward? Do you pray for your friends and associates and for those engaged in spreading the Gospel?

-Have you examined your beliefs and prepared yourself to share them, with sensitivity and humility, as the Holy Spirit leads?
