I rented a bicycle on vacation and was so looking forward to riding on the beach that afternoon. Unfortunately, I didn't make it to the beach. After adjusting the seat on the bike to what I thought was the correct height, I walked it into the parking lot and got on the seat only to realize too late that the seat was still too high. I lost my balance and fell on my left wrist. I heard the crunch of my wrist and a pain in my knee as I tried to lift my arm and recover from my fall. Blood was dripping down my arm and I could hear my sister scream, No! She took me to the hospital and the surgeon said it was the worst break he had seen in 40 years, breaking both the ulna and radius. I stayed in the ER all night by myself because COVID restrictions would not allow any visitors. During this time, I stared at the clock and prayed for God to help me in my brokenness, both physically and emotionally. In the stillness of the night when I felt alone, I knew I was not.

The next day I thought I was having surgery, but the surgeon decided after reviewing my x-rays again that I needed to come back home and see a hand specialist. My surgery was on 10/15 and again I felt that many prayers were answered and that I was in the right place with the right surgeon. I am now on the way to a slow recovery but there are little blessings along this journey. It was my left hand/wrist so I can still write and function using my dominant hand. Also, my knee seems much better and thankfully I didn't break a hip. Although I am facing another surgery in January, my trust is in the great healer. Until I am back to a new normal, I will do my physical therapy and rest in His shadow.

In a spirit of thankfulness, thank you to Forbush Friends USFW for hosting our Fall Annual Gathering on 9/11/21. These ladies blessed us with beautiful decorations, a wonderful meal, and we had great speakers, Bernie and Mac McDonald from Mesquakie Friends Center.

A Different Kind of Stewardship: Give Light to Your House

Matthew 5:15: *Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. ... and it shines to all who are in the house.*

What does it mean to let your light shine before others?

It means that if you are a good example, if you “let your light shine,” then when other people see your good example, they will know that you love our Heavenly Father and they, too, will want to honor Him.

But first we have to get our house ready. How do we do that?

Our bodies have to be ready and willing to shine so others can see. Do we eat right? Do we get the rest we need? Do we exercise our bodies and minds?

Burnout is a very real problem and it is precisely because we often take better care of others than we do of ourselves. God has called us to work and to serve, He has also called us to be good stewards of our minds and bodies; one is not more important than the other. Neglecting either one is just as sinful.

We need to make time to rest. We must make time to give our brains and bodies a break. We can start by ensuring that we are getting enough sleep at night. Studies show that we need seven to eight

hours of rest at night for our bodies to be rested and that's just physical rest. Mental rest and time for fun is equally important for our well-being. Scheduling vacations and using our off time to recharge our mental batteries needs to be a priority. Without the clarity of our minds our thoughts become cloudy and less likely to see what God would have us to be and do.

How about diet and exercise? Despite the hype about diet and exercise, it is still an important part of our overall well-being. Being a well-rested person with a terrible diet who doesn't get enough exercise is only going to cause us health problems sooner or later. Small improvements in the areas of diet and exercise now can help ensure that we remain healthy in the service of the Lord for many years to come. Our diet and exercise also help with our clarity of our mindset. Just removing some sugar, and occasional soda, smaller portions, etc. can make big changes and the short walk outside to see God's handywork all make us better, yet for some it is hard. Others have no problem. So why is it so hard. Because our mindset isn't where it should be. Mind and body have to be one. Soul searching and seeing where God wants us to be has to be there. Without it we can't be the very best we can be or what God wants is to be.

If our mind and body are one, then we become more enlightened, more ready for what the day will bring. What God has in store for us will be clearer. Isn't that the whole purpose of stewardship? To be the best we can be, so that God's light shines through to others. The Lord needs us at our best each and every day and we can only give Him our best when we've properly taking care of ourselves. CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Paul Anderson, author of Following Jesus - The Heart of Faith and Practice, discusses his call into Christian ministry. As a young pastor he was studying at Earlham School of Religion. His mentor, Elton Trueblood, challenged him with this statement, "If you are a Christian, you are a minister. A non-ministering Christian is a contradiction of terms....The church of Jesus Christ is a ship that carries no passengers, for all are members of the crew....The authentic follower of Christ works neither for self nor gain, but to serve the needs of others as Christ's hands and feet in the world."

This description of the "crew" on a ship is true for our NCUSFW work on the sanitary pad project. Some purchase and donate fabric, some cut the pattern pieces, some sew or serge those various pieces, and a few add the snaps that help make the whole idea work for those girls and young women in remote areas of Kenya, like Samburu and Turkana. Others package and mail the kits. In September we sent over 40 kits to Marian Baker who took them to Kenya in October! We are now working on a second batch to be mailed before the end of November for delivery to Kenya in January. WHAT A CREW!!

Here at home our school children are back in their classrooms. Counselors are eager to receive hygiene kits at their schools. Hygiene kits have been taken to 13 schools in the Randolph and Chatham county area. Do you know if there are needs for hygiene items in your area schools?

FEMAP has been busy this year distributing nearly 1200 kits (infant, school, hygiene and farmworker) in 2021. Donations of items are always welcome along with help packaging the kits on Wednesdays. Another opportunity for you to help is in the making of the small, stuffed bears that policemen and firemen use to calm young folks they encounter in their workdays.

During this Thanksgiving season we are so very grateful for all these ladies and a few gentlemen who work to fill the needs of so many in our communities.

Two Hundred Years of History

My meeting, Bethel Friends, is celebrating its 200th anniversary. On October 31, a beautiful fall day, we had a wonderful time worshipping, reminiscing, fellowshiping and looking back at the history of Bethel. In the beginning, our members were a part of Holly Springs Meeting. Due to the lack of good roads in the 1800s, the members in our area found it more and more difficult to travel to Holly Springs for meetings, so they asked that they become a preparatory meeting and they remained that way from 1821 to 1921! That's 100 years!

A lot happened during those first 100 years. Three meeting houses were built. The first log meeting house was built in 1821. A second log structure was constructed about 1855 after the first burned. The third, a white frame meeting house, was built in 1888. Also, during that first 100 years, two different schools were built on property owned by the meeting. The first school was built in the late 1800's and in 1906 it was replaced with a state supported school. That school closed in 1950.

Education has always been important to Quakers and books are surely a necessary part of the education process. We found many types of old books as we prepared our historical displays. We found record books for Sunday School, the Missionary Society, committee meetings, Christian Endeavor and Yearly Meeting Minutes. There were school books and books about Quakerism. There were Bibles and books about the Bible. All these books reflect the history of Bethel Friends Meeting.

200 years is a long time to be a part of a community. Through those years, our members have seen five meeting houses and two different schools built on our land. The fact that there were two schools was something of which our committee was not aware. The school that was built in the late 1880s would have fallen into obscurity if someone had not saved a copy of an essay that a young student had written about the past, present and future of Bethel School. The only school that we were aware of was the 1906-1950 school that several of our members had attended.

Thanks to the all the books and records that were saved and pasted down in albums through generations, we know about the people and the work at Bethel Friends Meeting over the past 200 years.

I encourage you to look through the books in your meeting's library. You never know what you will learn about your meeting's history.
