





Ramallah Head of School Visits Lindi Friends School in Kibera

In partnership with Nairobi Yearly Meeting, FUM has long supported the Lindi School, in the Kibera Slum of Nairobi. The school provides quality faith-based education, a safe place for children to play, and serves families who struggle to pay school fees. For many children, the meal they receive at school is their only meal for the day.

On June 26, Rania Maayeh, Head of Ramallah Friends School, along with other FUM staff, paid a pre-Triennial visit to the Lindi School, to think about whether there are ways that Ramallah Friends School and the Ramallah community could also come into partnership with the school. She spoke with the school's principal, with teachers, and with students, whom, on that day were taking standardized grade exams. These are some of her thoughts about the visit:

As I reflect on my visit to the Lindi Friends School, nestled within the slums of Nairobi, and witness the challenging circumstances in which those children live, a wave of emotions washes over me. The stark contrast becomes evident when I compare this experience to my visit to the International Friends School, which boasts a more favorable physical environment. However, this introspection also leads me to contemplate the situation back home in Palestine. Although we may not be considered privileged individuals, living under the weight of occupation and grappling with daily struggles, we are still privileged in various ways. (Continued)


Observing the lives of children in these slums, I am overwhelmed by the profound difficulties they face. Their living conditions are deplorable, with inadequate infrastructure, limited access to clean water, and scarce resources. Yet, despite these circumstances, their thirst for knowledge remains unwavering. They all yearn to learn and improve their lives. Drawing a comparison to the situation of our children in Palestine, a different kind of frustration engulfs me. We endure the hardships imposed upon us by the occupation—the checkpoints, the barriers, and the constant threat to our safety and freedom. Our daily lives are marked by uncertainty and an ongoing struggle for basic necessities. However, within this reality, we sometimes find ourselves living in a bubble—a bubble of privilege that shields us from the extreme poverty and destitution experienced by many others.

Despite our frustrations as Palestinians, we do have access to education, albeit with limitations. We have schools, albeit with restrictions and interruptions. We have the opportunity to pursue knowledge, develop skills, and aspire to a brighter future. Our children, burdened by the weight of the occupation and the obstacles they face in obtaining an education, find ways to grow, learn, and dream of a different reality.

Reflecting on these contrasting experiences, I am reminded of the importance of gratitude and empathy. We may encounter our own set of challenges, but it is crucial to acknowledge the privileges we possess. It is a privilege to have access to education, even if it is hindered by political circumstances. It is a privilege to have a relatively stable, safe, and healthy environment for our children (particularly at RFS) to learn and play."










Much is Growing at Ambwere Farm

The Ambwere family, Quakers from western Kenya, have leased a 900-acre farm to FUM. Recently FUM staff visited. It is not the 4th of July yet and the corn is way taller than knee high!

More about Ambwere Farm:

The Ambwere family, Quakers from western Kenya, offered to lease a 900-acre farm to FUM. The farm is located near Kitale, in an area that is very well suited for growing many crops, including maize (white corn).

Several Quakers in the Kitale area with experience and expertise in large scale agriculture, management, and finance have taken on the challenge of overseeing the farm. They hired a farm manager, negotiated the lease, and are putting a plan in place to protect the land and improve its productivity. Since then, the rains have been favorable, the inputs that were added to the soil have worked as hoped, and the crop is looking very good.

Why Farming?

Several years ago, Friends United Meeting began the task of long-term financial planning. The FUM General Board formed the Long Range Financial Planning Working Group to explore past giving trends and to project future trends. This group discovered that giving from North American Friends is decreasing, but that ministry needs are not. In response, the FUM General Board created the Sustainability Committee to develop business and investment projects and explore alternative ways to support FUM programs and priorities. This committee consists of four members from North America, four from Kenya, and one from Jamaica. This farming operation is the first project the committee has undertaken, but they look forward to finding many more ways to supplement the generosity of Friends and what God is doing through Friends United Meeting. If modestly successful, once all loans are repaid, taxes are settled, and operational costs are accounted, this farming project is

projected to net \$100,000 per year.




Francis Makete, one of the Ambwere Farm Sustainability Project committee members, and a farmer himself, looks over the FUM maize crop.

OUAKERS IN HISTORY

Edward Burrough

1634-1663



Burrough was born in Underbarrow, Westmoreland, and educated in the Church of England, but became a Presbyterian before converting to Quakerism. During his late teens, he heard George Fox preach in 1652 and immediately converted to what later came to be known as the Religious Society of Friends. He was consequently rejected by his parents. Burrough began itinerant preaching throughout England, traveling with another Friend, Francis Howgill.

Upon the Restoration in 1660, Burrough approached King Charles II, requesting protection and relief of Quakers in New England, who were being persecuted by Puritans there. Charles granted him an audience in 1661, and was persuaded to issue a writ stopping (temporarily) the corporal and capital punishments of the Quakers in Massachusetts.

Meet our Missions Turkana Friends

The Turkana people are semi-nomadic animal herders who are particularly vulnerable to drought and food insecurity, as well as to violent conflict with neighboring people-groups. Only 3% of Turkana adults have a secondary school education.

Turkana County in northwest Kenya is a desert landscape. As part of their daily life, girls and women walk great distances to fetch water. One priority of the Turkana Friends Mission is providing access to water through boreholes, tanks, and biosand water filters. Once water becomes accessible in a community, girls can pursue education at school. The Mission operates three primary schools and four nursery schools.

In addition to water access and education, the Mission offers adult literacy classes, training in small business development, women's self-help groups (in partnership with Right Sharing of World Resources), refugee ministries, peace building (in partnership with Friends Church Peace Team).
