The USFW-NC Eliza Armstrong Cox Scholarship committee met in April and 12 applicants were approved to receive the 2025-2026 scholarships. The selection committee included Alicia Sharp, USFW-NC Treasurer, Lee Van Hughes, Pat Davis, and Bennie Burton.

The six **new applicants**, or first-time applicants, will receive \$300 each for the 2025-2026 school year. The applicants were Cora Sparrow from Bethel Friends, Haley Hinshaw from Marlboro Friends, Avery Wright from Centre Friends, Seth Varner from Archdale Friends, Claire McCain from Cedar Square, and Robert Isaac Simmons from Springfield Friends Meeting. The six **returning applicants** will receive \$450 each. The returning applicants were Haley Quate from Deep Creek Friends, Sadie Badgett from White Plains Friends, Hunter Hall from Forbush Friends, Olivia Ray from Deep Creek Friends, Rachel Wilcox from Somerton Friends, and Maggie Ray from Deep Creek Friends Meeting.

The total money granted this year for the 12 applicants will be \$4500. The amount of money granted each year, depends on the money available and the number of applicants approved to receive the scholarship.

For 2025-2026, the committee also approved \$1500 for the **International Scholarship for Friends Theological College**.

It was heartwarming to read the academic accomplishments of these young people, their spiritual growth and their involvement in their meetings.

Thank you to all the USFW groups in North Carolina that continue to fund this scholarship.



"Love in Many Languages" 2025-2026 1 Thessalonians 2:8 FICTION

<u>A Lineage of Grace</u> by Francine Rivers. The Bible is filled with inspiring stories of unlikely candidates that God chose to change eternity. This historical fiction follows the lives of five women, Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary, as they lived daring lives and often made big mistakes. Their stories still hold great meaning and guidance for us today. **\$20**

<u>The Forge</u> by Chris Fabry. The Forge is about the power of prayer, the transformation only God can achieve, and the lasting influence one person can have on others. It is the story of a single mom who sees her child drifting away and turns to prayer and God to believe the impossible. This book was recently made into a motion picture and highlights the impact a mother can have on her child's life. **\$18**

<u>The School Mistress</u> by Tess Thompson. This story, based in the year 1910, follows Quinn Cooper on a train headed West to accept the position of schoolmistress in a small town in Colorado. She faces difficult travel of the day, the task of providing for her family back home, and the responsibility to instruct the children living there. The book is a sweet love story with a mix of mystery. The characters are well-developed and set a good example of kindness throughout the book. **\$18**

The Traveling Prayer Shawl by Jennifer Lynn Cary. A sweet story about letting God heal all our fears, bitterness, and poor decisions. The faith in God and love of family and friends shine in this book. Everyone knows the only way to survive life's problems is to wrap them in prayer. **\$16**

BIOGRAPHY

Finding Baby Holly by Holly Marie. Finding Baby Holly is the true, inspiring story of a wife and mother who was "missing" for over forty years after her parents' murders, the persistent detectives who never stopped investigating and the birth family who never lost hope in finding her. It is an incredible story of how powerful faith and family are in your life. **\$19**

Worth Celebrating by Miriam Dixon. This is an unusual book as it is a biography of a book, *Celebration of Discipline*. The original manuscript was written longhand on a yellow pad in a small Oregon town by a Quaker pastor describing twelve ancient Christian disciplines. This spotlighted the superficiality that had come to characterize Christianity and ignited the spiritual formation movement. This is the story of how a book can change a subculture. **\$23**

<u>Evidence Not Seen</u> by Darlene Deibler Rose. Darlene Deibler Rose was a Christian missionary in Papua New Guinea during and after World War II. During the war, she survived 4 years in a women's prison camp, her husband did not survive the war. Her Christian faith sustained her during those years. After the war, she remarried and continued her missionary work in New Guinea. **\$17**

<u>*The Watchmaker's Daughter*</u> by Larry Loftis. This novel is one of the greatest stories of World War II. Corrie ten Boom, a female Dutch watchmaker, and her family saved the lives of hundreds of Jews – at the cost of their own lives and survival in a concentration

camp. She not only survived but forgave her captors and lived the rest of her life as a Christian missionary. Her ability to forgive is a testament of her faith. \$22

GROWTH AND CHALLENGE

Everybody Always by Bob Goff. In *Everybody Always*, Bob shows you the simple truths about life that have the power to shift your mindset. Bob teaches you that the path forward is found in one simple truth: love people, even the difficult ones, without distinction and without limits. Learning to love as Jesus did is something we should all strive to do. **\$20** *God Never Gives Up on You* by Max Lucado. Struggling with doubt, insecurities, self-worth? This book will fill you with God's grace. Through the example of Jacob, Max gives us a lesson on God's perfect plan to use imperfect people to do great things. **\$20** *Pray First* by Chris Hodges. This book is a guide to revitalizing your prayer life, making prayer a daily priority, and experiencing deeper intimacy with God. No matter what you are doing throughout your day, praying first keeps you tethered to the One who loves you most. To know God at a deeper level you should Pray without ceasing, Pray with other people, and always *Pray First*! **\$20**

Keep It Shut by Karen Ehman. The average woman speaks over 20,000 words a day – not to mention the ones she types online! Often our words land us in a heap of trouble. This book will help you define gossip, think before you speak, and regard what the Bible teaches us about our speech laced with grace, as sweet as honey, and yet seasoned with salt. **\$20**

BY AND ABOUT QUAKERS

Palestine and Israel: Understanding Encounters by Max L. Carter. This book is a sequel to Max Carter's book "Palestine and Israel: A Personal Encounter," also published by Barclay Press. The first book covered Max's experiences in and about Palestine and Israel from 1970 to 2006. The Sequel draws from his experiences and posts from two dozen trips to the region since then, including the annual Friends United Meeting "Living Letters" service-learning trips that he and his wife Jane lead. **\$30**

<u>Close to the Surface</u> by Bethany Lee. Written by a Quaker pastor, the author recounts her family's story, her own uncertain pilgrimage, and the courage it takes to sail over the horizon and find your way home. The journey is beautifully written. **\$27**

<u>The Quakers</u> by Captivating History. It is always good to know how we started. The Quakers is a great read of the history of the Quakers from pre-colonial America through modern times. It highlights the contributions made to the abolitionist movement, disaster relief and peace movements. **\$15**

<u>Step by Step</u> by Rigaud and Penn. After *Brown v. Board of Education* was decided in 1954, a group of Black mothers in the small town of Hillsboro, Ohio, marched their children to the white school, demanding admission. After being rejected, they repeated the walk the next morning and every morning after that for two years. During the two years these students were homeschooled by their mothers with the help of a Quaker teacher. This book highlights these elementary students who became activists, even if they did not realize it at the time. **\$22**

STEWARDSHIP *Brenda McKinney*

According to Wikipedia, Christian stewardship is "the responsibility that Christians have in maintaining and using wisely the gifts that God has bestowed."

What is God's definition of stewardship?

"Now fear the Lord and serve Him with all faithfulness....But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve.... But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord," Joshua 24:14-15. A very familiar passage that I have seen displayed in several homes.

In the Old Testament, we see many examples of God choosing people to obey and serve – Abraham, Moses, Noah, Gideon, and many others. They chose to serve the Lord albeit sometimes reluctantly. We also must choose to serve the Lord, but how will we serve Him? How is the Holy Spirit leading us in our daily walk?

The most basic way to serve our church is to be present - singing, praising, and worshipping God with our church family. One of the best ways to become more engaged with our church family is to join a small group - a Bible study, a Sunday School class, hospitality committee, choir. We USFW members already serve by promoting and supporting our missions. God has bestowed at least one gift on each of us. We may have more than one "talent" and could choose another activity or committee that interests us and be committed to it. What do you enjoy doing? If I delight in the Lord, what would be the desire of my heart (see Psalms 37:4)? What brings you joy? What makes you feel good about yourself and your ability to be of help to someone else?

The people God chose in the Bible typically felt totally inadequate for the mission. It was their dependence on Him and their commitment to obey that led to their success. Don't feel inadequate. If the Holy Spirit is nudging you to serve, God will equip you for the task. Choose this day to serve the Lord by serving others. Remember the story of the ten talents. We have a responsibility to use wisely the gifts God has given us.

Take delight in the Lord, and He will give you the desires of your heart. -Psalm 37:4
