

A Word of Devotion:

FIVE WAYS TO Love at All times

By: Molly Howard Grand Canyon University Loving one another is very important to God. In fact, Jesus says it is the second greatest commandment (Matthew 22:39).

Sometimes we may not know the best way to show love to others or even how we can be loving in a particular situation. Proverbs 17:17 says that a "friend loves at all times." We should love others, not only during good times, but always. Here are a few ways to love at all times:

Carry Each Other's Burdens-Galatians 6:2

One way to love at all times is to carry each other's burdens. Especially during difficult times, people need someone who they can rely on.

Carrying each other's burdens might not look the same in every situation. Some people might just want a listening ear. Others might need physical help, such as help with yard work or cleaning. Still others might just want to know someone is there for them if they need it.

As Proverbs 17:17 says, "A brother is born for a time of adversity." When we carry each other's burdens, we are strengthening one another and living our lives to reflect Jesus and the words of the Bible.

Be Present in Rejoicing and Mourning-Romans 12:15

Often, in order to love people, we must be present in what they are experiencing, whether it be joy or hardship. Romans 12:15 says, "Rejoice with those who rejoice." When someone is finding success and going through happy times, we may feel jealous or question their happiness instead of rejoicing with them. However, we are told to rejoice with them and be happy in their celebrations as this shows the love of Christ.

However, we are also told to mourn with each other. In times of grief, sadness and hurting, it may seem easier for us to avoid the pain of others, rather than to comfort them through their circumstances. However, we are called to show love to our brothers and sisters in Christ in the good and the bad times.

Forgive One Another-Colossians 3:13

Forgiveness is powerful. Yet, love and bitterness cannot coexist. Colossians 3:13 tells us to forgive as the Lord forgave us. His forgiveness is perfect. Even though we do not deserve it, He freely offers it to us, and we should do the same for others.

1 Peter 4:8 says, "Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins."

Care About the Needs of Others-Philippians 2:3-4

Another way to show love at all times is to care about the needs of others. This can be need for physical items, such as the need for food or clothing. For example, you see that there is a coat drive for people in your community and you take the time to participate. Perhaps, you hear that your friend's car has broken down, and you show love by offering to give them a ride.

However, there can also be other needs that may not relate to possessions. For example, maybe you notice that a mother seems tired lately and offer to babysit her kids for a few hours so she can have a break. Or perhaps a friend has seemed down lately, so you schedule a time to talk and hang out to help fill that need. Philippians 2:3-4 talks about valuing other's interests above our own. Loving other people requires taking the focus from ourselves and putting it on other people.

Pray for One Another-James 5:13

In some circumstances, it may feel like we cannot do anything to help meet the needs of others. We do not have to feel helpless in these situations, instead we can pray for those people and their needs, as this is a great way to love others. We can bring the person to God in prayer.

Whether the person is going through hard times or struggles or they are at a high point in their life, prayer is powerful. I John 5:14 says, "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us.

1) Save **amber medicine bottles with the label removed** for **FAME** (Fellowship of Associates of Medical Evangelism). FAME began in 1970 in Columbus, IN as the result of a dream by Judge Milford Anness to start a Christian medical mission organization. FAME has grown from a group struggling to build one hospital in India, to an organization that has helped build 70 facilities in 29 countries around the world – hospitals, clinics, feeding centers, church buildings, housing for medical staff, and mobile medical units. FAME is now located in a warehouse on Southeastern Avenue in Indianapolis. For more information Google <u>FAME</u> Partners in Medical Evangelism.

2) As of December 2021: The Right Sharing of World Resources Stamp

Program accepts stamps of all issue dates and countries, both used and unused stamps, sheets of stamps, albums, boxed collections of stamps, envelopes, and postcards. With foreign stamps, if they are still on the envelope or postcard, leave them there. If they are already removed, they are still welcome. If there are special markings on any envelopes, leave the stamp on the envelope. If there are not, leave 1/8 – 1/4 around the edge so the **ENTIRE** stamp is preserved. PLEASE LEAVE PEELABLE STAMPS ON THE ENVELOPES AS THEY STICK TO OTHER STAMPS WHEN PEELED OFF. These stamps are purchased by stamp collectors and proceeds benefit RSWR (Right Sharing of World Resources). Any stamps are acceptable; however, NONPROFIT and PRESORTED ones have very little value. You can Google Right Sharing Stamp Program for more information.

Dear Friends,

As I hope you have heard already, a gathering for Young Adult Friends from around the world will be held from 1 – 5 August 2024, immediately before the FWCC World Plenary Meeting, from the 5 - 12 August 2024 in Johannesburg, South Africa.

Inspired by the Southern African word ubuntu, the theme will be based on Galatians 3:28 : "There is neither Jew nor Greek, neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

The event is intended to improve mutual understanding of Quaker diversity amongst Young Adult Friends worldwide, to reinforce international Quaker identity, and to re-establish the Young Adult Friends global network, leading to joint actions and plans. The event is planned by an international team consisting principally of Young Friends from Africa, with some representation from elsewhere, supported by elders from Southern Africa Yearly Meeting and the Africa Section.

This letter is to encourage young adult Friends, ages 18-35, to attend both conferences. Registration is open now at FWCC World Plenary Meeting. The cost for both conferences, all 12 days including room, board, and program, is \$1300 for Friends from higher income countries like the US and Canada. For lower income countries, the cost is \$130. Airfare and other expenses are separate.

From Friends Theological College, Robert Wafula writes:

"...Once in a while, we receive a visiting lecturer, particularly for our modular academic programs. The FTC students were blessed to have Jim Fussell from Baltimore Yearly Meeting. Jim is a graduate student at Earlham School of Religion in Indiana, and came to FTC by the recommendation of FUM as a Living Letter. He arrived on campus on November 20, and left on December 31. He taught two intensive courses for the Diploma in Theology programs. These were Books of the New Testament and Quaker History. Each of the two courses lasted ten days. While he tried his best to get acquainted with the culture and the accent of the community around him, his students had a share of their own endeavor to grasp Jim's American accent. When one of the lecturers asked some of Jim's students how they were enjoying having Jim as their instructor, one of them said, "Well, we would understand him (Jim) better only if he could try his best to speak not through the nose." Overall, by the end of his visit, Jim was beginning to gain a lot of rapport with the students and the FTC community."

OUAKERS IN HISTORY

Slavery in the Quaker World 1688



Quakers have long been hailed as heroes of the abolitionist movement. Friends like Anthony Benezet and John Woolman worked tirelessly to convince other Whites to abolish slavery and embrace liberty for all. Fourteen years ago, when I began research for my book Christian Slavery, I wanted to understand this abolitionist history better. I started with the "beginning": the first antislavery protest in North America, written by German and Dutch Quakers in Pennsylvania. But as I quickly learned, this was only part of the story when it comes to Quakers and slavery.

The 1688 Germantown Protest, as it is often called, was the first document in North America to denounce slavery. It is an extraordinary document. It declares, among other things, that the authors are "against the traffick of menbody." It goes on to explain that slavery cannot be a Christian practice and that it is against the Golden Rule. It is worth lingering on the following passage:

There is a saying, that we shall doe to all men like as we will be done ourselves; making no difference of what generation, descent or colour they are. And those who steal or robb men, and those who buy or purchase them, are they not all alike? Here is liberty of conscience, w[hi]ch is right and reasonable; here ought to be likewise liberty of ye body.
