A Word of Devotion:

"TEND THE GARDEN OF YOUR HEART" by: ann skalaski



"Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life" Prov. 4:23 Growing up in Florida, I never experienced four distinct seasons. When I migrated north in my late thirties, I quickly realized I did not care for snow, but I was captivated by the daffodils, tulips, and hyacinths that seemed to burst from the ground just as the snow melted. It still fascinates me that, after months of being

dormant under the frozen ground, the warmer temperatures cause these bulbs to bloom. Of course, we also know that as the days grow warmer, unwelcome weeds begin to sprout.

It's nature's reminder that whatever in buried under the ground comes back in due season.

I have seen this same principle play out in my heart. Whatever I bury there springs forth when things heat

up. This includes hurts, fears, ungratefulness, bitterness, and distorted views of myself or of God. If I allow these things to linger in my heart, they produce weeds. These weeds can erupt as unkind words in the heat of the moment. Or they can gradually fill my heart, choking out my joy and the good things God wants to produce in me. God's Word warns us, "Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life" (<u>Prov. 4:23</u> <u>ESV)</u>

Often, God uses the world he created to teach us how to follow him. In this case, the principles of tending a garden offer a vivid picture of vigilantly keeping our hearts. Seasoned gardeners know that they need to prepare the soil, plant good seed, nourish their garden and pull unwelcome weeds. Let's look at how this can apply to our hearts.

We cannot plant in hard soil; therefore, we must not allow our hearts to become hardened. Tilling the soil is arduous labor, and so is keeping our hearts soft. God gives his children a new, soft heart (<u>Ez. 36:26 ESV</u>), but we must work at keeping it soft. In Mark 8, just after Jesus miraculously fed four thousand with just seven loaves of bread, the disciples embarked on a boat trip, then realized they hadn't brought enough bread for the journey. "And Jesus, aware of this, said to them, "Why are you discussing the fact that you have no bread? Do you not yet perceive or understand? Are your hearts hardened?" (<u>Mark 8:17 ESV</u>, emphasis mine). When we fail to recognize and believe that Jesus provides what we need, our hearts risk becoming hardened. This can look like envy, discontent, fear or anxiety—all indicators that we lack faith in a good God who provides for his children. Trusting God and practicing gratitude keeps the soil of our heart well-tilled. We know the fruit that God desires to grow in us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (see <u>Gal.</u> <u>5:22-23)</u>. The Holy Spirit, promised to all who place their trust in Jesus <u>Ephesians 1:12-14</u>, plants these seeds in our

heart. They are gifts for us to cultivate. We also plant seeds in our hearts. The thoughts we entertain and the content we consume deposits seeds, for better or for worse. <u>Philippians 4:8</u> encourages us to plant good seeds: "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" (ESV). These thoughts plant good seeds, maybe even bulbs, producing captivating blooms that radiate God's glory.





# OUAKERS IN HISTORY B. WILLIAMS

## PHILADELPHIA, JANUARY 15, 1965

"As a good Quaker, I cannot countenance that!" How many times have we heard this statement? It summons up the picture of a stern, pious individual, so thoroughly a part of the Society of Friends that he knows all the traditions, witnesses, and rules and would suffer untold agonies rather than violate the least part of them. He is willing to go against the mores of society, to risk the disdain-even the wrath- of his fellows, to cling severely to the uses of his faith. It is a courageous picture, even if it is not a sympathetic one. Such a Friend is strong for the Faith; he is unyielding and quite satisfied. There is much to admire in this man.

He is halfway on the road to heaven.

The one thing he lacks, however, is perhaps the most important part. One of the names by which seventeenth- century Quakers were known was "The Seekers." The absence of form in their meetings for worship was based on the central theme of "waiting" on the Lord. Almost more than any other group of their time, they understood that the ways of God are unsearchable; that His ways are ways of paradox; that the least will be the greatest in the Kingdom; that the first will be last and the last first.


They knew that God had passed over several of the sons of Jacob to grant His blessing to Judah. God's high priest Eli, who sat in the temple daily, was not to hear God, but the child Samuel did. Amos, the shepherd of Tekoa, tending his flocks, heard the voice of the Almighty and understood it, while the high priest at Bethel, concerned with the rules of sacrifice, was not listening. The Pharisee in the temple, sure in his faith, thanked God that he was not as other men; he kept the rules.

Perhaps it is too harsh to compare with the Pharisee the Quaker who rules his life solely by traditions. He may not mean it with the firmness of the Pharisee, but he is glad to find something definite and righteous to hold on to. This is good, but it is still only half the journey. The rich young ruler, protesting that he had kept all the great precepts "from his youth up," was told to sell all he had and distribute to the poor.

#### **Steps Without Music**

THE classic question as to how many angels can stand on L the head of a pin may be an abstraction, but in the closing days of 1964 a very real problem to Alex Quaison-Sackey, President of the 19th General Assembly, was how much of the world's central political business he could balance on the head of a gavel. No one could have handled this highly sophisticated challenge with greater diplomatic skill or parliamentary poise than did this distinguished citizen of Ghana.

The Assembly had hoped to recess before Christmas. Its voting procedure was stymied by the deadlock over past peacekeeping assessments. But before the year's end three matters were to be decided: the filling of four vacancies on the Security Council; temporary expeuditure authorizations; and the establishment of the organizational machinery to carry on the work of the Conference on Trade and Development. It was now two days before New Year's. The plenary meeting called for three o'clock had beeu put off till six. It was seven-fifty, and
















Visit to Odre Muevo
