A Word of Devotion:

"PRACTICE What you Preach"

"...For they preach, but do not practice" -Matthew 23:3 Matthew 23:1-12

"Why don't you practice what you preach?" Have you ever said those words? Maybe someone has said them to you.

Hypocrites are people who pretend to be something they are not. They may say one thing and then do the opposite. They may act one way in a certain setting and then act another way in a different setting. It is very important that as Christians, we follow the example of Jesus Christ. It doesn't matter where we are or who we are with. The words we speak and the things we do should always reflect our faith. Sometimes we are good at telling other people what they should do and how they should live, but we fail to follow our own instructions. We need to, as the saying goes, "walk the walk, not just talk the talk."

Some time ago, I saw a Peanuts comic strip that had Snoopy on top of his doghouse with a flock of baby birds. The time had come for the baby birds to learn how to fly, and Snoopy was their teacher. Snoopy flapped his ears and walked to the end of the roof of the doghouse. He leaped into the air and continued to flap his ears. Unfortunately he landed right on his head. He got back up onto the roof and shared this lesson: "Do as I say to do and not what I do."

In Matthew 23, Jesus tells the crowds and his disciples to do what the Pharisees and the scribes teach them to do, "but do not do as they do, for they do not practice what they teach" In other words, the leaders talk the talk, but they don't walk the walk. Why is it important to practice what we preach? The most basic reason is the integrity of our faith; we are the body of Christ for the world.

In Matthew 5:14, Jesus tells us, "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid." People should be attracted by the light of the way we live and the words we speak. Whether we like it or not, people are watching us and seeing how we respond to the ups and downs of everyday life. Children watch adults and then imitate what they see and repeat what they hear.

Are our words and actions something we want repeated by our children? Our friends, neighbors, coworkers, family members, and classmates are watching us. What evidence do we offer of our profession of faith? Are our responses any different from those of persons who don't profess to know Christ? Not only are nonbelievers watching us, but so are other Christians. Persons who are new to the faith often look to more-mature Christians. Do our words and actions encourage and build up

other Christians?

We practice what we preach when we live our lives as reflections of the life of Christ. The way we act at work should be the same way we act at home, at church, around other Christians, in the supermarket, or waiting for a bus. My wife and I have always said, "What you see is what you get." We try to act the same wherever we are. When people see us, they should see a reflection of Christ. Do we live our lives in ways that reflect him?





Hope Carter has served as a missionary in Africa along with her husband, Bob Carter, for 38 years. They began their service as FUM Missionaries and in later years worked with SIM to continue their work in Africa. Over the years, they have worked with AIDs education, provided support for orphans, worked with TB and Leprosy services at Mukinge Hospital and mentored new pastors and leaders through promotion of the Jesus film.

For the past 11 years, they have lived in Kijabe, Kenya and divided their time between Kijabe Hospital and Moffat Bible College. Hope assisted the hospital with its HIV clinic for 2 years and then focused fulltime on teaching in AIDS Ministries at Moffat along with being the health coordinator. At the end of their 38 years of service, they will return to The United States after attending the FUM Triennial in July. They will return periodically to Africa for shorter periods of time while working remotely and helping the home office.

Please join us to hear Bob and Hope's story and all that has happened over the years in Africa. Their challenges and triumphs in Africa correlate with our theme of "Abounding in Hope" by the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Who Are We?

If I asked you to tell me who you are, what would you say? Many of us might start with our job or profession. Some might begin with our role in our family; father, mother, daughter, son, aunt, uncle, grandpa, grandmother, etc. Some others may find identity in our hobbies, sports, or organizational roles. All these things may say a lot about us, but as Christians, should we not first and foremost find identity in being a child of God?

As a child of God you have been chosen for adoption, blessed by His grace, made holy or set apart, and held blameless before Him. You have been redeemed by His blood, forgiven of all wrong, and counted as heirs of His kingdom. What on earth could possibly match this identity? An identity unearned that is ours by faith through grace.

No matter what else happens to us as we journey through life, our identity as God's children is secure. None of the world's prowers, no circumstance of good fortune or ill, no tragedy or triumph can diminish or steal our identity in the family of God.

As a child of God, we have a role to fulfill within His family. We have all been given gifts, talents, areas of expertise that we must seek to use to further His kingdom, and advance the gospel of Jesus Christ to the world which is largely unsaved and ambivalent, at best, to His word.

As Friends, we tend to hold tight to the traditions and forms that have been historically a part of our faith. I was raised in a Friends Meeting and I love our traditions. I love open worship and the working of Friends at all levels to come to unity before making a decision as a group. I love our history as peacemakers; as proponents of human rights and equality even when it was dangerous or unpopular. I love our encouragement of the ministry of every believer regardless of sex, race, or national origin, and I don't want to see any of these things diminish or go away.

What I do want to see for us is that each monthly meeting, quarterly meeting, and FCNC itself look at new ways to spread the gospel within our communities. Keep the things that still work well, but look for new ways to reach out to a changing population. This will involve trial and error and a good bit of effort from each of us. We must move forward undaunted knowing that we will experience some failures as well as successes. Do this knowing that if we share all of our efforts within the wider body of Friends we may help others who are striving for the same goal.

Don't be afraid to change in an effort to be more effective. If we are not spreading the gospel through word and deed then we fall short of our calling as God's children.

Quakers use the term Query to refer to a question or series of questions used for reflection and in spiritual exercises. Friends have used Queries as tools for offering spiritual challenges to the community for much of their history.
